- ▼享和元年見座道場 (Kinen-ji Training Ground, 1801)
- ▼寛政一二年渡原道場 (Watanabe Training Ground, 1790)
- ▼文政元年来栖道場・同三年寿川道場 (Nakatsuji Training Ground, 1828)
- ▼天保一二年小瀬神明社・同年下梨地主社 (Kose Shrine, 1831)
- ▼弘化三年小原乙劍社・同年上梨鐘樓堂 (Kobayashi Ebisuya Shrine, 1846)
- ▼嘉永五年小来栖道場 (Kameyama Training Ground, 1852)
- ▼安政五年相倉道場相念寺 (Sakakura Training Ground, 1858)

五箇山・白川郷での大窪大工の活躍期 (Active Period of Oshio Tsuboi in Gokuraku-cho, Hida, 1800-1850): A bracketed section of the timeline.

重層構造への時代 (Multi-layered Structure Era): This era begins around 1800 and ends around 1850. It is characterized by the transition to heavy timber-framed houses (重層木造).

巨大化への時代 (Giantization Era): This era begins around 1850 and ends around 1900. It is characterized by the further development of heavy timber-framed houses.
